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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School Miami, Florida

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School, (the "School") a component unit of the District School Board of Miami-Dade County, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These basic financial statements are the responsibility of the School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School, a component unit of the District School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, as of June 30, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 4, 2012, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and important for assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 8 and pages 22 and 23 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Auditing Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School June 30, 2012

The corporate officers of Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School (the "School") have prepared this narrative overview and analysis of the School's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The liabilities of the School exceeded its assets at June 30, 2012 by \$129,872 (deficit).
- 2. At year-end, the School had current assets on hand of \$73,850.
- 3. The School had an excess of expenses over revenues of \$126,628 during its first full year of operations.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The School's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2012 are presented under GASB 34. The financial statements have three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other required supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The *government-wide financial statements* are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The *Statement of Net Assets* presents information on all of the School's assets and liabilities. The difference between the two is reported as *net assets*. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as an indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

The *Statement of Activities* presents information on how the School's net assets changed during the fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event resulting in the change occurs, without regard to the timing of related cash flows. Accordingly, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 9 - 10 of this report.

Fund Financial Statements

A "fund" is a collection of related accounts grouped to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities, projects, or objectives. The School, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and report compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

All of the funds of the School are governmental funds. *Government Funds* are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements.

Government Fund financial statements, however, focus on *near-term* inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on the balances of spendable resources which are available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be used to evaluate a government's requirements for near-term financing.

Prior to the start of the School's fiscal year, the Board of the School adopts an annual budget for its general and special revenue fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the School's governmental funds to demonstrate compliance with the School's budget. The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 11 - 14 of this report.

Notes to Financial Statements

The notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

The notes to basic financial statements can be found on pages 15 - 21 of this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, over time net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a school's financial position. In the case of the School, liabilities exceeded its assets by \$129,872 (deficit) at the close of the fiscal year, its first full year of operations. A summary of the School's net assets as of June 30, 2012 follows:

At June 30, 2012, the School's total assets were approximately \$223,000 and total liabilities were approximately \$377,000. The School had minor expenses in the 2011 fiscal year, however, the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012 was the first full year of operations. At June 30, 2012, the School reported a deficit in total net assets of approximately \$130,000. Due to the School's first full year of operations, the School had to update the facilities to get them ready for the school year and approximately \$113,000 of fixed assets were capitalized. The School's liabilities primarily consisted of amounts due to the management company for advances made to the School to help the School's cash flow at June 30, 2012.

The School's total revenues for the year ended June 30, 2012, were approximately \$1,406,000 while its total expenses were approximately \$1,533,000 for a net decrease of approximately \$127,000. This was the School's first full year of operations. Although enrollment for the 2011-12 school year increased throughout the year to 230 students, the School only received FEFP funding based on 217 students. As a result, funding was less than what was originally budgeted by the School to cover expenses.

For the 2012-13 fiscal year, the School expects to be in a better financial position due to increased funding from FEFP state funding due to the increased enrollment from 217 students to 290. This should result in an additional \$438,000 of state funding for the School. In addition, the School, during the 2011-12 fiscal year had approximately \$80,000 of start-up expenses such as textbook purchases, furniture, equipment, supplies and other repairs that were as a result of the opening of the School for its first school year. These are one-time expenses that will not occur in the 2012-13 fiscal year.

The School expects to re-pay all amounts due to other agencies and to be in a better financial position at the end of the 2012-13 fiscal year.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During 2011-2012, the School completed its 1st year of operations. The School served over 230 students throughout the year and is projected to have approximately 290 students for the 2012-2013 school year. The increase is due to a high retention rate and a steady growth of satisfied parent referrals.

The School met or exceeded the district's averages on the high performance sections of the FCAT. However, the School had a large portion of students from the private sector with no prior FCAT scores. Because of this, the School did not have sufficient data to demonstrate gains in certain sections of the FCAT and therefore did not receive a letter grade for the first year of the School.

The School has a competitive athletics program which received district awards and placements in soccer, baseball and cheerleading. The School together with its local sponsors fundraised and improved their sports field. The campus was able to build an artificial turf multi-use field for soccer and football, a rubber surfaced basketball court and an innovative tire obstacle course.

Even though the School was not a recipient of the Start Up and Implementation State Grant, it has placed a fundraising plan to incorporate increased technology. The School has established a "parents of the round table" philosophy to incorporate and increase its fundraising efforts. Throughout this program it is projected that every classroom at the conclusion of the 2012-2013 school year will have Promethean Interactive Board and three more desktop stations. This has become a priority of the school board, administration and parents alike.

During its first full year of operations, the school was completely wired to have internet access from every classroom as well as wireless access throughout the building. This is the goal of all Brigepoint Academy Schools as it will allow for their academic program to continue competing with the ever changing improvements in today's technology.

SCHOOL LOCATION

The School operates in the Miami area located at 137 NE 19th Street, Miami, FL 33132.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUND

As noted earlier, the School uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

The focus of the School's *governmental funds* is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of *spendable* resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In particular, *unassigned fund balance* may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

At the end of the fiscal year, the School's governmental funds reported a combined ending fund balance deficit of \$171,679 and a deficit of \$168,435 for its first full year of school operations.

CAPITAL ASSETS

The School's investment in capital assets, as of June 30, 2012, amounts to \$112,682 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes leasehold improvements, fixtures, furniture and equipment and audio visual materials and computer software.

LONG-TERM LIABILITIES

The School was advanced \$75,000 during the year by Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. The advance bears interest at June 30, 2012, at 6.0% and matures in March 2015. The balance at June 30, 2012, was \$70,875. The School made principal repayments of \$4,125 for the year ended June 30, 2012.

GOVERNMENTAL FUND BUDGET ANALYSIS

Prior to the start of the School's fiscal year, the Board of the School adopted an annual budget. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the governmental funds to demonstrate compliance with the School's budget.

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

Reporting Entity

Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School, (the "School") a component unit of the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida is sponsored by its charter-holder, Bridgepoint Academy, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation, organized pursuant to Chapter 617, Florida Statutes, the Florida Not For Profit Corporation Act, and Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes. The governing body of the School is the Board of Directors which is comprised of five members.

The general operating authority of Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School (the "School") is contained in Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes. The School operates under a charter of the sponsoring school district, the District School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida (the "School Board"). The current charter is effective until June 30, 2015. At the end of the term of the charter, the School Board may choose not to renew the charter under grounds specified in the charter, in which case the School Board is required to notify the School in writing at least 90 days prior to the School's expiration. During the term of the charter, the School Board may also terminate the charter if good cause is shown. The charter may be renewed for up to an additional 10 years by mutual agreement.

These financial statements are for the year ended June 30, 2012, when 230 students were enrolled in grades Kindergarten through 5th grade.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

Based on the guidance provided in the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants Audit and Accounting Guide – Audits per State and Local Governments and provisions of Florida Statutes, the School is presented as a governmental organization for financial statement reporting purposes.

Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include the statement of net assets and the statement of activities. These statements report information for the School as a whole. Both statements report only governmental activities as the School dues not engage in any business type activities.

The statement of activities reports the expenses of a given function offset by program revenues directly connected with the functional program. A function is an assembly of similar activities and may include portions of a fund or summarize more than one fund to capture the expenses and program revenues associated with a distinct functional activity. Program revenues include: (1) charges for services which report fees, (2) operating grants and contributions which finance annual operating activities, and (3) capital grants and contributions which fund the acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation of capital assets. These revenues are subject to externally imposed restrictions to these program uses. Other revenue sources not properly included with program revenues are reported as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements are provided for governmental funds. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, equity, revenues and expenditures. Major individual governmental funds, namely, the general, special revenue and capital project funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements:

<u>General Fund</u> – is the School's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources not accounted for and reported in another fund.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

<u>Special Revenue Fund</u> – used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are restricted or committed to expenditure for specific purposes other than debt service and capital projects.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of Bridgepoint of Greater Miami Charter School, (the "School") are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The School's reporting entity applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. The government-wide financial statements apply Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) pronouncements and Accounting Principles Board (APB) opinions issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements, in which case, GASB prevails.

The government-wide statements report using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Revenues from non-exchange transactions are reported according to Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Codification Section 1600.111 and Section N50 *"Accounting and Financial Reporting for Non-Exchange Transactions"*. On the accrual basis, revenues from grants and donations are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements report using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. Measurable means the amount of the transaction can be determined. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities. The School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 90 days of the end of the fiscal year. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for long-term debt principal and interest which are reported as expenditures in the year due.

Budgetary Basis Accounting

Budgets are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. During the fiscal year, expenditures were controlled at the object level (e.g., salaries, purchased services, and capital outlay).

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The School's cash is considered to be cash on hand and demand deposits, with original maturities of three months or less.

Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable consists of after school care fees pending to be collected. Any bad debts are expensed in the subsequent period when they are determined to be uncollectible.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Due from Other Agencies

Due from other agency consists of amounts due from other governmental units for revenues from federal, federal through state, state, or other sources and from advances made to other governmental units.

Capital Assets, Depreciation and Amortization

Capital assets purchased or acquired are carried at historical cost or estimated historical cost. The School capitalization levels are \$750 on tangible personal property. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method. When capital assets are disposed, the costs and applicable accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in operations. Estimated useful lives, in years, for depreciable assets are as follows:

Furniture and equipment	5 Years
Computer equipment and software	7 Years
Building and improvements	39 Years

Compensated Absences

The School grants a specific number of days of sick/personal leave. Full-time employees are eligible for one day per month to up to ten days of active work during the ten-month period (a "benefit year"). In the event that available time is not used by the end of the benefit year, employees may "rollover" all unused days for use in future benefit years. There is an opportunity to "cash out" unused sick days however, the employees may only cash out if they have used three days or less of their sick leave in that benefit year. Employees may not cash out more than ten days per school year and are required to always maintain a minimum of twenty-one unused days. The cash value is eighty percent of their current daily rate. There is no termination payment for accumulated unused sick days.

GASB Codification Section C60, *Accounting for Compensated Absences*, provides that compensated absences that are contingent on a specific event that is outside the control of the employer and employee should be accounted for in the period those events take place. Accordingly, these financial statements do not include an accrual for compensated absences available to be used in future benefit years.

The School also provides certain days to be used for specific personal matters such as family death and jury duty. Because the use of such days is contingent upon those events taking place and such events are out of the control of both the employer and the employee, there is no accrual for such days.

Government-wide Fund Net Assets

Government-wide fund net assets are divided into three components:

- <u>Invested in capital assets, net of related debt</u> consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition or improvement of those assets.
- <u>Restricted net assets</u> consists of net assets with constraints placed on their use either by external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments. There were no restricted net assets for the years ending June 30, 2012.
- <u>Unrestricted</u> all other net assets that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Governmental Fund Balances

In the governmental fund financial statements, fund balances are classified as follows:

- <u>Nonspendable</u> fund balance associated with inventories, prepaid expenses, long-term loans and notes receivable, and property held for resale (unless the proceeds are restricted, committed, or assigned). At June 30, 2012, the School had \$37,000 in nonspendable fund balance.
- <u>Restricted</u> fund balance category includes amounts that can be spent only for the specific purposes stipulated by constitution, external resource providers, or through enabling legislation. At June 30, 2012, there is no restricted fund balance.
- <u>Committed</u> fund balance classification includes amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes determined by a formal action of the School's Board of Directors. At June 30, 2012, there is no committed fund balance.
- <u>Assigned</u> fund balance classification are intended to be used by the School's management for specific purposes but do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed. At June 30, 2012, there is no assigned fund balance.
- <u>Unassigned</u> fund balance is the residual classification for the School's general fund and includes all spendable amounts not contained in the other classifications.

Order of Fund Balance Spending Policy

The School's policy is to apply expenditures against non-spendable fund balance, restricted fund balance, committed fund balance at the end of the fiscal year by adjusting journal entries. First Non-spendable fund balances are determined. Then restricted fund balances for specific purposes are determined (not including non-spendable amounts). Then any remaining fund balance amounts for the non-general funds are classified as restricted fund balance. It is possible for the non-general funds to have negative unassigned fund balance when non-spendable amounts plus the restricted fund balances for specific purposes amounts exceed the positive fund balance for the non-general fund. As of June 30, 2012, there are no minimum fund balance requirements for any of the School's funds.

Revenue Sources

Revenues for operations will be received primarily from the District School Board of Miami-Dade County (the "School Board") pursuant to the funding provisions included in the School's charter. In accordance with the funding provisions of the charter and Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes, the School will report the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the School Board. Under the provisions of Section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, the School Board reports the number of the full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) for funding through the Florida Education Finance Program. Funding for the School is adjusted during the year to reflect the revised calculations by the FDOE under the Florida Education Finance Program and the actual weighted full-time equivalent students reported by the School during the designated full-time equivalent student survey periods. In addition, the School receives an annual allocation of charter school capital outlay funds for leasing of School facilities.

The School may also receive federal awards for the enhancement of various educational programs. Federal awards are generally received based on applications submitted to and approved by various granting agencies. For federal awards in which a claim to these grant proceeds is based on incurring eligible expenditures, revenue is recognized to the extent that eligible expenditures have been incurred. Any excess amounts are recorded as deferred revenues until expensed. Additionally, other revenues may be derived from various fundraising activities and certain other programs.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes

The School is a division of a nonprofit corporation. The School qualifies as a tax exempt organization under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is, therefore, exempt from income tax. Accordingly, no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events

The School has evaluated subsequent events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through September 4, 2012, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 – CAPITAL ASSETS

NOTE 4 – TRANSACTIONS WITH MANAGEMENT COMPANY

The School entered into an agreement with S.M.A.R.T. Management LLC to provide professional management and consulting services to the School. In its capacity as the management company, S.M.A.R.T. Management LLC manages the finances and operations and makes recommendations to the School's independent board of directors which make the final determinations regarding polices and contracts.

NOTE 4 – TRANSACTIONS WITH MANAGEMENT COMPANY (Continued)

In providing management services to the School, officers of the management company may not serve as members of the Board of Directors of the School. The agreement began on July 1, 2010 and it is a five year agreement with a School option to renew. The contract calls for a management fee equal to 10% of full time equivalent (FTE) revenues. During the year-ended June 30, 2012, the School incurred management fees of \$131,110. At June 30, 2012, the School had a payable to the management company for \$13,116.

For the year ended June 30, 2012, the School was advanced amounts by the management company and its owners to help pay for certain expenses. The amount of \$97,833 is due at June 30, 2012 to the management company for advances made during the year and is included on the Statement of Net Assets under Due to Other Agencies.

NOTE 5 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The School entered into a lease agreement in January 2011 to lease facilities. The first payment commenced on September 1, 2011 and requires monthly lease payments of \$18,500 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012 and with annual base rent increases of the greater of 5% or CPI for the year. For the year ended June 30, 2012, the amount paid by the School for the use of the facilities and services was \$203,350. The term of this agreement ends August 31, 2016, and has an option for two 5 year renewals.

NOTE 6 – DUE TO BRIDGEPOINT ACADEMY INC

The School, as described in Note 1, is sponsored by its charter-holder, Bridgepoint Academy, Inc., a not-forprofit corporation. In March 2012, Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. obtained an unsecured line of credit loan from a financial institution in the amount of \$100,000. The amount can be drawn by Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. at anytime. The line of credit bears interest at the financial institution's prime rate. At June 30, 2012, the interest rate was 6.0% and matures in March 2015. The line of credit requires a minimum monthly payment equal to the sum of $1/36^{th}$ of the unpaid principal and interest accrued at the end of the month.

In March 2012, Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. advanced \$75,000 to the School. The School reimburses Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. under the same terms. This amount has been included under due to Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. in the Statement of Net Assets. The balance at June 30, 2012 was \$70,875. Maturities at June 30, 2012 are as follows:

NOTE 7 – RELATED PARTIES

The School is sponsored by its charter-holder Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. which also sponsors two other charter schools: Bridgepoint Academy Charter School and Bridgepoint Academy of Village Green. At times during the year these schools may advance funds to each other. During the year ended June 30, 2012, the School was advanced \$38,054 by these other charter schools. Of this amount, the School paid back \$27,128. The balance due to these other charter schools at June 30, 2012 was \$10,925 and is included in Due to Other Agencies in the Statement of Net Assets.

In addition, Bridgepoint Academy, Inc. advanced the School \$75,000 during the year. (See Note 6)

NOTE 8 – DEPOSITS POLICY AND CREDIT RISK

It is the School's policy to maintain its cash and cash equivalents in major banks and in high grade investments.

As of June 30, 2012, the carrying amount of the School's operating cash deposit accounts was \$67,455 and the bank balance totaled \$80,820. As of June 30, 2012, balances held in financial institutions did not exceed the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC) limit.

NOTE 9 – GRANTS

In the normal course of operations, the School receives grant funds from various federal, state and local agencies. The grant programs are subject to audit by agents of the granting authority, the purpose of which is to ensure compliance with conditions precedent to the granting of funds. Any liability for reimbursement which may arise as the result of these audits is not reflected in these financial statements.

NOTE 10 - OPERATIONS

For the year ended June 30, 2012, the School's expenses exceeded its revenues by \$126,628 as indicated in the Statement of Activities. In addition, the School has a deficit in net assets of \$129,872. This was the School's first full year of operations and as indicated in the management, discussion and analysis section of this report, the School has detailed a plan on improving the School's financial position.

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Bridgepoint Academy of Greater Miami Charter School (the "School"), a non-major component unit of the District School Board of Miami-Dade County, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon dated September 4, 2012.

We conducted out audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We have issued our Independent Auditors' Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters. Disclosures in those reports, which are dated September 4, 2012, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

Additionally, our audit was conducted in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 10.850, *Rules of the Auditor General*, which governs the conduct of charter school and similar entity audits performed in the State of Florida. This letter includes the following information, which is not included in the aforementioned auditor's reports or schedule:

- Section 10.854(1)(e)1., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we determine whether or not corrective actions have been taken to address findings and recommendations made in the preceding annual financial audit report. This was the School's first audit and therefore there were no previous findings.
- Section 10.854(1)(e) 3., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we address in the management letter any recommendations to improve financial management. In connection with our audit, we did not have any such recommendations.
- Section 10.854(1)(e)4., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we address violations of contracts or grant agreements, or abuse, that have an effect on the financial statements that is less than material but more than inconsequential. In connection with our audit, we did not have any such findings.

- Pursuant to Sections 10.854(1)(e)7.a. and 10.855(10), Rules of the Auditor General, we applied financial condition assessment procedures as of June 30, 2012, which included calculation and analysis of certain financial indicators we considered relevant to the School. Our financial condition assessment procedures did not include the use of benchmarks. It is management's responsibility to monitor the School's financial condition assessment was based in part on representations made by management and the review of financial information provided by management. This was the School's first full year of operations and therefore we could not apply such procedures. See Management, Discussion and Analysis on pages 4-8.
