#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) Miami, Florida

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) (the "School"), a charter school under Pinecrest Academy, Inc., as of, and for the year ended June 30, 2015, which collectively comprises the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

# Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

## Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### **Opinions**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) at June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Other Matters**

As described in Note 1, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present only the financial position of Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) at June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended, and is not intended to be a complete presentation of Pinecrest Academy, Inc. These financial statements do not purport to and do not present fairly the financial position of Pinecrest Academy, Inc. as of June 30, 2015 and its changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

## **Required Supplementary Information**

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated August 31, 2015, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 10 and 30 through 31 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

## Management's Discussion and Analysis

Pinecrest Academy (South Campus)
(A Charter school Under Pinecrest Academy, Inc.)
June 30, 2015

The corporate officers of Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) have prepared this narrative overview and analysis of the school's financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2015.

## Financial Highlights

- 1. The net position of the School at June 30, 2015 was \$3,512,023.
- 2. At year-end, the School had current assets on hand of \$2,585,540.
- 3. The School had an increase in its net position of \$482,980 during the year ended June 30, 2015
- 4. The unassigned fund balance at year end was \$1,886,977.

#### Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The School's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2015 are presented in accordance with GASB Codification Section 2200. The financial statements have three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other required supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

# Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Position presents information on all of the School's assets, and deferred outflows of resources and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. The difference between the four is reported as net position. Over time increases or decreases in net position may serve as an indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information on how the School's net position changed during the fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported when the underlying event occurs without regard to the timing of related cash flows. Accordingly, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 11 - 12 of this report.

## Fund Financial Statements

A "fund" is a collection of related accounts grouped to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities, projects, or objectives. The School like other state and local governments uses fund accounting to ensure and report compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

All of the funds of the School are governmental funds. Governmental Funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. Governmental Fund financial statements, however, focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on the balances of spendable resources which are available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be used to evaluate a government's requirements for near-term financing.

The Board of the School adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with the School's budget.

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 13 - 17 of this report.

#### Notes to Financial Statements

The notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

The notes to the financial statements can be found on pages 18 - 29 of this report.

#### GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Assets exceeded liabilities by \$3,512,023 at the close of the fiscal year. As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a charter school's financial position. A summary of the School's net position as of June 30, 2015 and 2014 follows:

The School's revenues and expenses decreased by \$589,686 and \$396,782 during the year. The School had an increase in its net position of \$482,980.

# School Location and Lease of Facility

The School leases facilities located at 15130 S.W. 80<sup>th</sup> Street, Miami, Florida 33193.

## Accomplishments

In 2015, Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) completed its eighth year of operations, enrolling 733 students in grades K-8. The School earned a letter grade of "A" for the 9<sup>th</sup> consecutive year, ranking as one of the highest-performing public elementary schools in Miami-Dade County, and among the top public elementary schools in Florida.

This past year, students and teachers of Pinecrest Academy South were recognized for various accomplishments:

• SECME/Math Bowl- Students participated in the SECME Olympiad and the Math Bowl.

- National Elks Free Throw Shooting Contest- 3 students received the District and Regional Awards
- Participation in the National Fit to Achieve Day- 2 fifth grade students competed against other Miami-Dade Elementary schools.
- VEX IQ Robotics Competition Our Robotics Competitive team participated in 5 local competitions and qualified for the VEX IQ State Robotics Competition at the University of South Florida where one of our teams won 1<sup>st</sup> place. Our Robotics Team also participated in the STEM Tech Olympiad at the Miami Beach Convention Center where our robots won first and second place awards.
- Competition Cheerleading Team- COA National Champions; 1st Place and Grand Champions True Spirit Cheer and Dance Regional Competition; Marlin's game
- Boys' Basketball Team- Achieved the championship title and were undefeated the entire season.
- Raised over \$2,600 for the American Heart Association through the Jump Rope for Heart Initiative

Pinecrest Academy students' artwork were recognized in the following exhibitions:

Future Educators of America, Art Club, Peer Mediators, Safety Patrol, Chorus, Basketball, Citizens, Newspaper Club, Cheerleading, Morning News Crew, Green Team and Robotics Competitive Team. Outsourced Extracurricular Activities: Basketball, Soccer, Ballet, Tap, Karate and Tennis

School wide Character Education Program- All students in Kindergarten thru 5th grade have the opportunity to earn our Pinecrest Pirate Lanyard of Honor. Students receive pins in recognition for their academic, behavioral and extracurricular accomplishments. Monthly Pirate activities are conducted and students can cash in loot for events such as Fall Celebration, Movie Day, Circus Theme and Summer Games.

Reading Plus and Accelerated Reader Celebrations- Students are rewarded with ice cream parties for meeting their quarterly goals.

Pirates for Peace- Our school-wide character education program which motivated our students to live up to the Pinecrest Pirate values. This group collected recycled clothing in order to provide clean water for impoverished countries.

#### **Events**

- Career Day- Students were exposed to different careers through small presentations made by our local community members.
- Science Fair Night- Students showcased their Science Fair exhibits while teachers conducted live experiments.
- Field Day- Students in all grade levels participated in outdoor games and Olympic style activities.
- Earth Day- Students recited earth day oaths and heard important facts about animals that surround our school gardens. Students also inaugurated a butterfly garden.
- Bully Free Week- School wide lessons and activities emphasized the importance of maintaining a bully free school.
- Holiday Show- Chorus, Pre-K and Kindergarten performances @ The South Miami-Dade Cultural Arts Center
- End of Year Show "Jazz…A Groovy Celebration" Students in 1<sup>st</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grade along with Chorus performed at the South Miami Dade Cultural Arts Center
- Cookies and Milk with Santa- Families enjoyed cookies and milk with Mr. and Mrs. Claus
- Barnes and Noble Night Fundraiser chorus students performed while students visited arts and crafts and face painting stations
- Walk Safe Activities-Through our Physical Education program, we incorporated activities that promoted safe walking. Students were taught how to be a safe pedestrian.
- Hispanic Heritage Parade- Students celebrated the heritage of their selected countries while they listened to music, learned about different customs and sampled an assortment of native countries while they enjoyed chorus and dance performances.
- Red Ribbon Week- Students listened to lessons, through the morning announcements, on how to live a healthy and drug-free life.
- Storybook Character Parade- Administrators and staff joined students in dressing up as their favorite storybook characters.
- We're an A Day Party- Rewards were given out to students achieving high standards and learning gains on the FCAT. Students enjoyed popcorn, cotton candy, snow cones and bounce houses to celebrate our school's great achievement.
- FCAT Incentives and Rewards Students that achieved learning gains and high scores on the FCAT were awarded a field trip to Sky Zone to celebrate their achievements.
- Thanksgiving Food Drive Each grade level donated various food items that were delivered to families in need.
- Go Green Charity Recyclers- Peer Mediators collected clothes and shoes to recycle
- School-Wide Recycling Program Green Team Club members collected recycled papers each week to help keep our earth clean.
- Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy and JDRF (Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation) Students dressed up in wacky attire to help raise awareness and funds for these two causes that are near and dear to the hearts of Pinecrest families. Funds collected totaled \$1,800.
- Cranes for a Cure Art installation of 1,000 origami cranes project to raise awareness of childhood cancer. Students and families were invited to help and fold 1,000 cranes as a symbol of hope and our school donated \$800 to the Children's Cancer Caring Center.
- Walk Your Heart Out Students participated in a walk-a-thon where students raised over \$15,000 by walking one mile around Kendall Greens Park. These funds are used for school improvement projects.

#### **Fundraisers**

The following fundraisers helped raise over \$20,000 in enhancing the school's facility and educational resources: Weekly bake sales, Mrs. Field's Cookie Dough, Jean Days and Dress Down Days.

Pinecrest Academy provides its students with a rigorous curriculum, as well as an extracurricular program of activities, including team sports and clubs such as National Elementary Honor Society, Future Educators of America, Art Club, Peer Mediators, Safety Patrol, Chorus, Basketball, Citizens, Newspaper Club, Cheerleading, Morning News Crew, and Green Team. The school also offers Outsourced Extracurricular Activities such as Volleyball, Basketball, Soccer, Ballet, Hip Hop, and Zumbatomic.

Pinecrest Academy South Campus has implemented a noteworthy School wide Character Education Program where all students in Kindergarten thru 5th grade have the opportunity to earn the "Pinecrest Pirate Lanyard of Honor." Students receive their first lanyard and a pin as recognition for their academic, behavioral and extracurricular accomplishments. When one visits the classrooms, hallways, cafeteria, playground and restrooms, they can read the Expectations of a Pinecrest Pirate. All staff members are loaded with loot and can award students when caught being Passionate, Inquisitive, Respectful, Assertive, Team players that are Empathetic. Monthly Pirate activities are conducted and students can cash in loot for events such as Build Your Own Sundae, Summer Games, Dance Off with Administration and Sports celebrations.

Pinecrest Academy South Campus is one of only a few public elementary schools in Miami-Dade County to be fully accredited by AdvancEd under the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS –CASI) division.

#### **Capital Improvement Requirements**

The School maintains a continuous capital improvement program to enhance facilities and update fixtures and equipment as required.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUND

As noted earlier, the School uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

#### Governmental Funds

The focus of the School's *governmental funds* is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of *spendable* resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In particular, the *unassigned fund balance* may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

Most of the School's operations are funded in the General Fund. The majority of the General Fund revenues are distributed to the School by the District through the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP), which uses formulas to distribute state funds and an amount of local property taxes (i.e., required local effort) established each year by the Florida Legislature.

At the end of the fiscal year, the School's governmental general fund reported ending fund balance of \$2,298,789. The fund balance unassigned and available for spending at the School's discretion is \$1,886,977. These funds will be available for the School's future ongoing operations.

#### **Capital Assets**

The School's investment in capital assets as of June 30, 2015 amounts to \$361,484 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes building and improvements and furniture, fixtures, computer equipment and textbooks.

#### Governmental Fund Budget Analysis and Highlights

Prior to the start of the School's fiscal year, the Board of the Charter School adopted an annual budget. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the governmental funds to demonstrate compliance with the School's budget.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

## Reporting Entity

Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) (the "School"), is a charter school sponsored by the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida (the "District"). The Schools' charter is held by Pinecrest Academy, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation organized pursuant to Chapter 617, Florida Statutes, the Florida Not-For-Profit Corporation Act. The governing body of the School is the board of directors of Pinecrest Academy, Inc., which is composed of six members and also governs other charter schools. The board of directors has determined that no component units exist that would require inclusion in the School's financial statements.

The general operating authority of the School is contained in Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes. The School operates under a charter granted by the sponsoring district, the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida. The current charter expires on June 30, 2016 and is renewable for an additional term pursuant to law and/or by a mutual written agreement between the School and the District. At the end of the term of the charter, the District may choose not to renew the charter under the grounds specified in the charter in which case the District is required to notify the School in writing at least 90 days prior to the charters expiration. During the term of the charter, the District may terminate the charter if good cause is shown.

The School's location is in Miami, Florida for children from kindergarten through fifth grades and is funded by the District. These financial statements are for the year ended June 30, 2015, when a total of approximately 732 students were enrolled for the school year.

On June 18, 2015 the charter school contract between the School Board of Miami Dade County and Pinecrest Academy, Inc. on behalf of Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) was amended to consolidate the charter with Pinecrest Palms Academy (WL# 4364) into one charter servicing grades Kindergarten through grade five, commencing with the 2015-2016 school year. The consolidated school will be identified by WL#0342.

#### Basis of presentation

The School's accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States as applicable to state and local governments. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

#### Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The School does not have any items that qualify for reporting in this category.

#### Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include the statement of net position and the statement of activities. These statements report information about the School as a whole. Any internal interfund activity has been eliminated from these financial statements. Both statements report only governmental activities as the School does not engage in any business type activities. These statements do not include fiduciary funds.

The statement of activities reports the expenses of a given function offset by program revenues directly connected with the functional program. A function is an assembly of similar activities and may include portions of a fund or summarize more than one fund to capture the expenses and program revenues associated with a distinct functional activity.

Program revenues include: (1) charges for services, such as food service and student activity fees; (2) operating grants such as the National School Lunch Program, Federal grants, and other state allocations; and (3) capital grants specific to capital outlay. Other revenue sources not included with program revenues are reported as general revenues.

#### Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements are provided for governmental and fiduciary funds, even though the fiduciary funds are not included in the government-wide financial statements. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, equity, revenues and expenditures. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements:

General Fund - is the School's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the school, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue Fund - accounts for specific revenue, such as capital outlay funding and federal lunch program that are legally restricted to expenditures for particular purposes.

Agency Fund – accounts for resources of the School's Internal Fund, which is used to administer monies collected at the schools in connection with school, student athletics, class, and club activities.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

## Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the School are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The School's reporting entity applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance. The government-wide statements report using the economic resources measurement focus and the full accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows.

The School recognizes assets of non-exchange transactions in the period when the underlying transaction occurs, when an enforceable legal claim has arisen, or when all eligibility requirements are met. Revenues are recognized, on the modified accrual basis, when they are measurable and available. Non-exchange transactions occur when the school provides (or receives) value to (from) another party without receiving (or giving) equal or nearly equal value in return. Most donations are examples of non-exchange transactions. Revenues from grants and donations are recognized on the accrual basis, in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements report using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined. "Available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. The School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year. Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) revenues are recognized when received. A one-year availability period is used for revenue recognition for all other governmental fund revenues. Charges for services and fees are recognized when cash is collected as amounts are not measurable. When grant terms provide that the expenditure of funds is the prime factor for determining eligibility for federal, state, and other grant funds, revenue is recognized at the time the expenditure is made. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for long-term debt principal and interest which are reported as expenditures in the year due.

Agency fund assets and liabilities are accounted for on the accrual basis of accounting.

#### **Budgets and Budgetary Accounting**

In compliance with Florida Statutes, the Board of Directors adopts an annual budget using the modified accrual basis of accounting. During the fiscal year, expenditures were controlled at the object level (e.g. salaries and benefits, purchased services, materials and supplies and capital outlay) within each activity (e.g. instruction, pupil personnel services and school administration). Revisions to the annual budget are approved by the Board.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

## Deposits and Investments

All deposits are held in major banks and high grade investments. The School has not adopted a formal investment policy; however the School invests excess deposit funds in collateralized repurchase agreements. Cash and cash equivalents include all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less. All deposits and investments in repurchase agreements are carried at cost plus accrued interest.

#### Inter-fund Transfers

Outstanding balances between funds are reported as "due to/from other funds. Inter-fund transfers are made to move any excess or shortage of funds derived from the National School Lunch Program from the Special Revenue Fund to the General Fund.

## Due from Other Governments or Agencies

Amounts due to the School by other governments or agencies are for grants or programs under which the services have been provided by the School.

## Capital Assets

The School's property, plant and equipment with useful lives of more than one year are stated at historical cost and comprehensively reported in the statement of net position in the government-wide financial statements. Donated capital assets are recorded at their estimated fair market value on the date donated. The School generally capitalizes assets with a cost of \$500 or more. Building improvements, additions and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the asset value or materially extend useful lives are not capitalized. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method. When capital assets are disposed, the cost and applicable accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in operations. Estimated useful lives, in years, for depreciable assets are as follows:

Building and Improvements	10 - 20 Years
Furniture and Equipment	5 Years
Textbooks and Software	3 Years

#### Compensated Absences

The School grants a specific number of sick days. Full time instructional employees are eligible to one day per month to up to ten days of active work during the ten-month period (a "benefit year"). In the event that available time is not used by the end of the benefit year, employees may "rollover" all unused days for use in future benefit years. There is an opportunity to "cash out" unused sick days however, the employees may only cash out if they have used three days or less of their sick leave in that benefit year.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Employees may not cash out more than ten days per school year and are required to always maintain a minimum of twenty-one unused days in order to cash out. The cash out value is eighty percent of their current daily rate. There is no termination payment for accumulated unused sick days.

GASB Codification Section C60, Accounting for Compensated Absences, provides that compensated absences that are contingent on a specific event that is outside the control of the employer and employee should be accounted for in the period those events take place. Accordingly, these financial statements do not include an accrual for compensated absences available to be used in future benefits years. The School also provides certain days to be used for specific personal matters such as family death and jury duty. Because the use of such days is contingent upon those events taking place and such events are out of the control of both the employer and the employee, there is no accrual for such days.

#### Revenue Sources

Revenues for current operations are received primarily from the District pursuant to the funding provisions included in the School's charter. In accordance with the funding provisions of the charter and Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes, the School will report the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the District. Under the provisions of Section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, the District reports the number of the full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) for funding through the FEFP. Funding for the School is adjusted during the year to reflect the revised calculations by the FDOE under the FEFP and the actual weighted full-time equivalent students reported by the School during the designated full-time equivalent student survey periods. After review and verification of FTE reports and supporting documentation, the FDOE may adjust subsequent fiscal period allocations of FEFP funding for prior year errors disclosed by its review as well as to prevent statewide allocations from exceeding the amount authorized by the Legislature. Normally, such adjustments are treated as reductions of revenue in the year the adjustment is made.

In addition, the School receives state funds through the District under charter school capital outlay funding pursuant to Section 1013.62, Florida Statutes. Funds are based on a capital outlay plan submitted to the District and are to be used for lease of school facilities.

Finally, the School also receives Federal awards for the enhancement of various educational programs. Federal awards are generally received based on applications submitted to and approved by various granting agencies. For Federal awards in which a claim to these grant proceeds is based on incurring eligible expenditures, revenue is recognized to the extent that eligible expenditures have been incurred. Any excess amounts are recorded as deferred revenues until expended. Additionally, other revenues may be derived from various fundraising activities and certain other programs.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### Net position and Fund balance classifications

Government-wide financial statements

Equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a) Net investment in capital assets and long term receivables consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition or improvement of those assets and long term receivables.
- b) Restricted net position consists of balances with constraints placed on their use either by external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments.
- c) <u>Unrestricted net position</u> all other balances that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets and long term receivables."

## Fund financial statements

GASB Codification Section 1800.142, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions, defines the different types of fund balances that a governmental entity must use for financial reporting purposes. GASB requires the fund balance amounts to be properly reported within one of the fund balance categories list below:

- a) Nonspendable includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Consists of fund balance associated with inventories, prepaid expenses, long-term loans and notes receivable, and property held for resale (unless the proceeds are restricted, committed, or assigned).
- b) <u>Restricted</u> this classification includes fund balance category amounts that can be spent only for the specific purposes stipulated by constitution, external resource providers, or through enabling legislation.
- c) <u>Committed</u> fund balance classification includes amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes determined by a formal action of the School's Board of Directors. There are no committed fund balances at year end.
- d) <u>Assigned</u> fund balance classification that is intended to be used by the School's management for specific purposes but do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed. There are no assigned fund balances at year end.
- e) <u>Unassigned</u> portion of the fund balance that has not been restricted, committed or assigned for a specific purpose. This is the residual classification for the School's general fund.

## Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

## Order of Fund Balance Spending Policy

The School's policy is to apply expenditures against non-spendable fund balance, restricted fund balance, committed fund balance, assigned fund balance, and unassigned fund balance at the end of the fiscal year by adjusting journal entries. First Non-spendable fund balances are determined. Then restricted fund balances for specific purposes are determined (not including non-spendable amounts). Then any remaining fund balance amounts for the non-general funds are classified as restricted fund balance. It is possible for the non-general funds to have negative unassigned fund balance when non-spendable amounts plus the restricted fund balances for specific purposes amounts exceed the positive fund balance for the non-general fund.

#### Income Taxes

Pinecrest Academy, Inc. qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is, therefore, exempt from income tax. Accordingly, no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

#### Subsequent Events

In accordance with GASB Codification Section 2250.106, the School has evaluated subsequent events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through August 31, 2015, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

## Note 2 – Deposits and Investments

#### **Deposits**

The School maintains its cash and cash equivalents in major banks and in high grade investments. As of June 30, 2015, the carrying amount of the School's deposits and investments was \$2,455,438; of which \$378,000 consisted of bank balances and \$2,300,000 was fully collateralized under a repurchase agreement with Regions Bank (the "Bank").

Deposits at FDIC-insured institutions are insured up to \$250,000 per depositor, per financial institution. The School is a charter school under Pinecrest Academy, Inc., which also operates various other charter schools. All bank accounts are opened under the account ownership of Pinecrest Academy, Inc., therefore, bank balances at times may potentially be in excess of FDIC coverage. As of June 30, 2015, bank balances in potential excess of FDIC coverage totaled \$401,666; including fiduciary account bank balances.

#### Investments and Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that in the event of a failure of a depository financial institution, the School will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of the failure of the counterparty to a transaction, the School will not be able to recover the value of investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At June 30, 2015, all of the School's investments in repurchase agreements were held as part of the Bank's investment portfolio.

The School has not formally approved an investment policy regarding custodial credit risk; however it mitigates its credit risk by maintaining excess funds available in overnight repurchase agreements. Amounts invested in repurchase agreements are secured obligations collateralized by securities that include: non-callable U.S. Government and Agency Securities; Callable and Structured Agency Securities; Agency Mortgage-Backed Securities guaranteed by a federal agency, Bonds issued by government sponsored enterprises, Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae. Amounts invested in repurchase agreements are not insured by the FDIC and are subject to investment risks, including possible loss of principal invested, and if the Bank fails the School will become a secured creditor and may become an unsecured general creditor to the extent the market value of the securities used as collateral falls below the outstanding amount of repurchase obligations to the School.

## Note 4 – Intangible Asset

The School capitalized \$79,614 of legal fees incurred in connection with services provided to prepare the School's facility for use. The fees are being amortized over the life of the facility lease using the straight-line method for the term of twenty years. For the year ended June 30, 2015, the School recorded \$3,980 in amortization expense relating to the asset.

## Note 5 – Education Service and Support Provider

Academica Dade, LLC, an education service and support provider, offers management and administrative services to the School including, but not limited to, facility design, staffing recommendations, human resource coordination, regulatory compliance, legal and corporate upkeep, maintenance of the books and records, bookkeeping, budgeting and financial reporting and virtual education services. The agreement calls for a fee on a per student basis.

The agreement with Pinecrest Academy, Inc. is for a period of five years, through June 30, 2016, and unless terminated by the board shall be renewed along with any renewals to the charter agreement. During the year ended June 30, 2015, the School incurred approximately \$329,625 in fees.

#### Note 6 – Transactions with Other Divisions of Pinecrest Academy, Inc.

The School operated a Pre-K program during the year. Revenues from this program was \$291,001 and was recorded as charges for services in the statement of activities.

The School made long term, non-interest bearing advances to Pinecrest Academy, Inc. The outstanding balance at June 30, 2015 was as follows:

During 2015, the School's facility was shared with Pinecrest Palms Academy. Management allocates a proportionate share of leases, salaries, lunch receipts, food and supplies and other expenses to each school individually based on student enrollment.

Pinecrest Academy, Inc. charges all its affiliated schools an assessment for shared corporate costs and accreditation expenses. Pinecrest Academy (South Campus) paid Pinecrest Academy, Inc. approximately \$73,200 in connection with these charges during the year.

## Note 7 – Commitments, Contingencies and Concentrations

The School entered into a lease and security agreement with Kendall Greens, LLC for its 52,396 square feet main campus facility including all ancillary facilities, outdoor areas and other improvements. The landlord is an affiliate of the School's education service and support provider (See note 5). Initial fixed annual payments under this agreement (based on \$13.78 per square foot) are approximately \$721,000 adjusted annually based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI) plus additional property expenses including repairs, maintenance and insurance.

The agreement continues through July 31, 2026 with an option to renew for an additional five-year term. Under the agreement, the School must meet certain covenants and requirements, including a "Lease Payment Coverage Ratio" of not less than 1.10 to 1.00. In addition, the School is required under the terms of the lease agreements to maintain a reserve for property expenses such as repairs, maintenance, taxes and insurance equal to 5% of their gross revenues for the fiscal year. As of June 30, 2015, the required reserve was \$298,180, and reflected as restricted on statement of Net Position. Finally, under this agreement the School has granted a first lien on its pledged revenues, which include all revenues collected by the school from the Florida Department of Education, the District, and all other sources.

The school is leasing office equipment for approximately \$14,100 per year through 2019. For 2015, rent expense totaled \$843,655.

#### Contingencies and Concentrations

The School receives substantially all of its funding from the District under the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP), which is based in part on a computation of the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students attending different instructional programs. The accuracy of FTE student data submitted by individual schools and used in the FEFP computations is subject to audit by the state and, if found to be in error, could result in refunds to the state or in decreases to future funding allocations.

## Note 7 – Commitments, Contingencies and Concentrations (continued)

Additionally, the School participates in a number of federal, state and local grants which are subject to financial and compliance audits. It is the opinion of management that the amount of revenue, if any, which may be remitted back to the state due to errors in the FTE student data or the amount of grant expenditures which may be disallowed by grantor agencies would not be material to the financial position of the School.

Pursuant to the Charter School contract with the School District, the District withholds an administrative fee of 2% of the qualifying revenues of the School. For the year ended June 30, 2015, administrative fees withheld by the School District totaled \$34,344.

#### Note 8 – Risk Management

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, thefts of, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions and natural disasters for which the School carries commercial insurance.

#### Note 9 - Defined Contribution Retirement Plan

The School's personnel, who are leased through ADP TotalSource Group, Inc., are eligible to participate in a defined contribution 401(k) plan sponsored by the leasing company, covering employees who meet certain age and tenure requirements. Under the ADP TotalSource Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan"), the School provides a match of 50% of the employee's contribution up to 4% of the employee's compensation. The School contributed to the Plan \$14,886 for the year ended June 30, 2015. The School does not exercise any control or fiduciary responsibility over the Plans' assets, which are administered by MassMutual Financial Group.

## Note 10 – Subsequent Event

Effective July 1, 2015, the School moved to utilizing a government money market mutual fund as an investment vehicle for it excess deposit funds. A government money market mutual fund invests exclusively in obligations issued or guaranteed by the U.S. Government and its agencies and instrumentalities and in repurchase agreements collateralized by such securities. All balances held under the repurchase agreement as of June 30, 2015 have been moved to this new vehicle.

## **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the School's internal control over financial reporting to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

## **Compliance and Other Matters**

During the current year audit procedures, we noted improvements over disbursements regarding dual signatures and review of recap sheets. However, the School still had deposits that were not supported by recap sheets.
