We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Archimedean Academy, Inc., (the "School") a component unit of the District School Board of Miami-Dade County, as of, and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These basic financial statements are the responsibility of the School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit. The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the School's 2005 financial statements and, in our report dated August 19, 2006 we expressed unqualified opinions on the respective financial statements of the governmental activities and the general fund.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Archimedean Academy, Inc., as of June 30, 2006 and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated August 25, 2006, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) on pages 4 through 8 and the Schedules of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance—budget to actual on page 21 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

Archimedean Academy, Inc. June 30, 2006

The corporate officers of the Archimedean Academy, Inc. (the "School") have prepared this narrative overview and analysis of the School's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006.

Financial Highlights

- 1. The assets of the School exceeded its liabilities at June 30, 2006 by \$124,613 (net assets).
- 2. At year-end, the School had current assets on hand of \$491,419
- 3. The net assets of the School increased by \$87,342 during the year.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The School's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2006 are presented under GASB 34. The financial statements have three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The *Statement of Net Assets* presents information on all of the School's assets and liabilities. The difference between the two is reported as *net assets*. Over time increases or decreases in net assets may serve as an indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information on how the School's net assets changed during the fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported when the underlying event occurs without regard to the timing of related cash flows. Accordingly, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 9 - 10 of this report.

Fund Financial Statements

A "fund" is a collection of related accounts grouped to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities, projects, or objectives. The School like other state and local governments uses fund accounting to ensure and report compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

All of the funds of the School are governmental funds. Government Funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. Government Fund financial statements, however, focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on the balances of spendable resources which are available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be used to evaluate a government's requirements for near-term financing.

The Board of the School adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with the School's budget.

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 11 - 14 of this report.

Notes to Financial Statements

The notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

The notes to the financial statements can be found on pages 15 - 20 of this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The assets of the School exceeded its liabilities at June 30, 2006 by \$87,342. As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a charter school's financial position. A summary of the School's net assets as of June 30, 2006 and 2005 follows:

Archimedean Academy's revenue increased by \$1,467,081 in the current year primarily due to an increase in student enrollment. The School also had an increase of expenses for the year of \$1,410,483. In addition, the school increased its capital assets by \$298,526. The School had an increase in its net assets of \$87,342 for the year.

Lease of Facility

The School is located at 12425 SW 72nd Street (Sunset Drive), Miami-Dade, Florida, 33183.

Capital Improvement Requirements

The School maintains a continuous capital improvements program to enhance facilities and update fixtures and equipment as required.

Achievements

Archimedean Academy ranked as one of the top performing elementary schools in Miami-Dade County. The school earned a letter grade of "A" during the 2005-2006 school year, and received a School Recognition Award from the Florida Department of Education. It also achieved Adequate Yearly Progress under *No Child Left Behind*.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUND

As noted earlier, the School uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental Funds

The focus of the School's *governmental funds* is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of *spendable* resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In particular, *unreserved fund balance* may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

Capital Assets

The School's investment in capital assets as of June 30, 2006 amounts to \$524,282 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes furniture, fixtures and computer equipment.

Governmental funds report capital outlays as expenditures. However, in the statement of activities, the cost of those assets is allocated over their estimated useful lives as depreciation expense. This is the amount by which capital outlays of \$343,274 exceed depreciation expense of \$44,748.

The proceeds from debt issuance provide current financial resources to government funds, but issuing debt increases long-term liabilities in the statement of net assets. Repayment of debt principal is an expenditure in the governmental funds, but the repayment reduces long-term liabilities in the statement of net assets. This is the amount by which proceeds of \$486,362 exceeded repayments of \$35,320 in the current period.

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

Archimedean Academy, Inc., (the "School"), is a not-for-profit charter school located in Miami, Florida for children from kindergarten through fifth grade. The School operates under a charter granted by the sponsoring district, the Miami-Dade County Public School District. The current charter is effective until June 30, 2012 and is renewable for an additional 15 years by a mutual written agreement between the School and the District. During the term of the charter, the District may also terminate the charter if good cause is shown. The School is considered a component unit of such District. Archimedean Academy, Inc. is funded by the Miami-Dade County Public School District and in addition, receives government grants.

These financial statements are for the year ended June 30, 2006, when 473 students were enrolled for the school year.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include the statement of net assets and the statement of activities and changes in net assets. These statements report information for the School as a whole.

The statement of activities reports the expenses of a given function offset by program revenues directly connected with the functional program. A function is an assembly of similar activities and may include portions of a fund or summarize more than one fund to capture the expenses and program revenues associated with a distinct functional activity. Program revenues include: (1) charges for services which report fees; (2) operating grants and contributions which finance annual operating activities; and (3) capital grants and contributions which fund the acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation of capital assets. These revenues are subject to externally imposed restrictions to these program uses. Other revenue sources not properly included with program revenues are reported as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements are provided for governmental funds. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, equity, revenues and expenditures. Major individual governmental funds, namely, the general, special revenue funds and capital project are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements:

<u>General Fund</u> - is the School's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the school, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Special Revenue Fund</u> - accounts for specific revenue, such as federal grants, that is legally restricted to expenditures for particular purposes.

<u>Capital Projects Fund</u> – accounts for funds received from the Public Education Outlay program, which are used for the rent of facilities and other allowable capital expenditures.

NOTE 2 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of the School are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The School's reporting entity applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. The government-wide financial statements apply Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) pronouncements and Accounting Principles Board (APB) opinions issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements, in which case, GASB prevails.

The government-wide statements report using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Revenues from non-exchange transactions are reported according to Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 33 <u>Accounting and Financial Reporting for Non-Exchange Transactions</u>, as amended by GASB Statement No. 36 <u>Recipient Reporting for Certain Shared Non-Exchange Revenues</u>, they include grants and donations. On the accrual basis, revenues from grants and donations are recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements report using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. Measurable means the amount of the transaction can be determined. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities. The School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for long-term debt principal and interest which are reported as expenditures in the year due.

Budgetary Basis Accounting

Budgets are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. During the fiscal year, expenditures were controlled at the object level (e.g., salaries, purchased services, and capital outlay).

Cash

Cash and cash equivalents include all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less.

Due from Other Governments or Agencies

Amounts due to the School by other governments or agencies are for grants or programs under which the services have been provided by the School.

Other Assets

Other assets consist mainly on prepaid expenses, which are paid upon the receipt of the goods or services that were received but not consumed at year end. The expenditure will be recorded when the asset is used.

Long-term Debt

In the government-wide financial statements, outstanding debt is reported as liabilities. Long term liabilities are due in more than one year.

The governmental fund financial statements recognize the proceeds of debt and premiums as other financing sources of the current period. Financing costs are reported as expenditures.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Capital Assets, Depreciation and Amortization

The School's property, plant and equipment with useful lives of more than one year are stated at historical cost and comprehensively reported in the statement of net assets in the government-wide financial statements. Donated assets are stated at fair value on the date donated. The School generally capitalizes assets with cost of \$500 or more. Building improvements, additions and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the asset value or materially extend useful lives are not capitalized. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method. When capital assets are disposed, the cost and applicable accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in operations. Estimated useful lives, in years, for depreciable assets are as follows:

Revenue Sources

Revenues for operations will be received primarily from the Miami-Dade County District School Board pursuant to the funding provisions included in the School's charter. In accordance with the funding provisions of the charter and Section 1002.33, Florida Statues, the School will report the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the District. Under the provisions of Section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, the District reports the number of the full-time equivalent (FTE) students and related data to the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) for funding through the Florida Education Finance Program. Funding for the School is adjusted during the year to reflect the revised calculations by the FDOE under the Florida Education Finance Program and the actual weighted full-time equivalent students reported by the School during the designated full-time equivalent student survey periods. In addition, the School receives an annual allocation of charter school capital outlay funds for leasing of school facilities.

Finally, the School may also receive Federal awards for the enhancement of various educational programs. Federal awards are generally received based on applications submitted to and approved by various granting agencies. For Federal awards in which a claim to these grant proceeds is based on incurring eligible expenditures, revenue is recognized to the extent that eligible expenditures have been incurred. Any excess amounts are recorded as deferred revenues until expended.

Compensated Absences

The School grants a specific number of days of vacation/sick/personal leave. Full time instructional employees are eligible for one day per month up to ten days of active work during the ten month period. Employees and administrators wishing to carry forward unused vacation days, at year-end, may do so. The employee can only cash out if they have used three days or less of their vacation days in that school year. The employees cannot cash out more than ten days per school year and are required to always maintain a minimum of ten days unused vacation. The cash out value is eighty percent of their daily rate.

Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 16, Accounting for Compensated Absences, requires governmental agencies to record as a liability the vested and future rights to sick and/or vacation leave. Accordingly, the financial statements include an accrual for such vested rights.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Transactions with Affiliates

The School has been granted a Charter by the sponsoring district and operates and reports under that charter. However, the School may be part of a corporation which includes several other charter schools. These financial statements report the financial condition and operations of the charter school only and not of the corporation. In the normal course of its business, the School may transact with other affiliated charter schools that are part of the corporation including the sharing of facilities and expenses. See notes in these financial statements as to transactions with other schools and operating leases and other commitments.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain accounts in the June 30, 2005 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the June 30, 2006 presentation.

NOTE 3 – INCOME TAXES

The School qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is, therefore, exempt from income tax. Accordingly, no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 4 - DUE FROM AGENCIES

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2006 was \$44,758 and has been allocated to various functions in the Statement of Activities.

NOTE 6 - ORGANIZATION'S MANAGEMENT

The School has entered into an agreement with Academica Dade, LLC (f/k/a Academica, Corp.), a professional Charter School management company, to provide management and administrative services to the School. In providing management services to the School, officers of the management company may not serve as members of the Board of Directors of a school. The contract calls for a fee of \$450 per student per year and is renewable annually. During the year ended June 30, 2006, the School incurred \$212,963, in management fees. At year end, the School owed the management company approximately \$18,000 for past due current year management fees and \$350,137 for prior year management fees. This balance is included in accounts payable and long term liabilities.

NOTE 7 – LINE OF CREDIT

During 2006, the School obtained a line of credit from the management company to be used on an as-needed basis. The balance of the line of credit as of June 30, 2006 was \$0.

NOTE 8 – LONG-TERM DEBT

The School has a note payable to a financial institution with a balance of \$136,225 at June 30, 2006. The note is secured by equipment and matures in 2008. Interest on the note accrues at Prime plus .75% annually.

NOTE 9 - COMMITMENTS UNDER OPERATING LEASES/ CONTINGENCIES

The School leases its campus from Archimedean Properties, LLC pursuant to a lease term from July 2005 through June 2008. The School shares its facilities with Archimedean Middle Conservatory and lease payments are allocated 88% to the School and 12% to the Conservatory. Monthly lease payments are approximately \$51,000.

In addition, the School leases office equipment payable at approximately \$1,300 each month through September 2007.

Total rent expense for the year ended June 30, 2006 was approximately \$662,000.

Finally, the School carries comprehensive liability insurance for claims that may arise in the regular course of business. At the present time, management believes that any claims the school may have are insured and that any expense associated therewith will not materially affect the financial position of the School.

NOTE 10 – DEPOSITS POLICY AND CREDIT RISK

It is the School's policy to maintain its cash and cash equivalents in major banks and in high grade investments.


As of June 30, 2006, the carrying amount of the School's deposits was \$281,288 and the respective bank balances totaled \$322,799. Out of the total bank balances \$100,000 were covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC).

NOTE 11 - GRANTS

In the normal course of operations, the School receives grant funds from various federal, state and local agencies. The grant programs are subject to audit by agents of the granting authority, the purpose of which is to ensure compliance with conditions precedent to the granting of funds. Any liability for reimbursement which may arise as the result of these audits is not reflected in these financial statements.

NOTE 12 - TRANSACTION WITH OTHER SCHOOLS

The School received an advance from Archimedean Middle Conservatory of \$7,386 and this amount has been recorded as a payable at June 30, 2006.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted certain matters that we reported to management of Archimedean Academy, Inc. in a separate management letter which is included in this reporting package.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Archimedean Academy, Inc.'s financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The purpose for this letter is to communicate to you any comments and recommendations, and to comply with the requirements of Chapter 10.850 Rules of the Auditor General, Charter School Audits which requires that this report specifically address but not limit to the matters outlined in Rule 10.854(i)(d).

The following statements relate to requirements of the Auditor General:

- 1. There were no inaccuracies, irregularities, shortages, defalcations and/or violations of laws, rules, regulations or contractual provisions reported for the preceding audit.
- 2. Prior year findings and recommendations were followed. (See below.)
- 3. The following are recommendations to improve the School's financial management, accounting procedures and internal controls:

CURRENT YEAR FINDINGS

Observation

The School has significant long term liabilities of approximately \$485,000 on its Statement of Net Assets.

Recommendation

The School should reduce its long term liabilities by improving its operations including the increase in student enrollment, revenues, and reduction of expenses.

PRIOR YEAR FINDINGS

Operations

Observation

The School had a negative change in fund balance of \$82,528 in the governmental fund financials.

Recommendation

The School must increase its revenues or reduce its expenses in the upcoming year.

Financial position

Observation

The School's current liabilities of \$295,041 are substantially higher than its current assets of \$94,506. In addition, the School has unrestricted net assets of negative \$(179,634).

Recommendation

The School must improve it financial position by generating more revenues than expenses, reducing its liabilities and increasing cash on hand.

- 4. There were no violations of laws, rules, regulations or contractual provisions discovered during our audit.
- 5. There were no illegal or improper expenditures discovered during our audit, relating to improper or inadequate accounting procedures, improperly recorded transactions, fraud or other reportable conditions.

The following is the response by the School's Board of Directors to your observation:

CURRENT YEAR FINDINGS:

Observation

The School has significant long term liabilities of approximately \$450,000 on its Statement of Net Assets.

Management Response

The school is on a gradual path toward increasing enrollment in its educational program. Since the school has a dual language immersion curriculum, enrollment growth must be moderated and " closely monitored" to properly service incoming students. This past year, the school had a significant improvement in its current year financial performance and concluded the year with a net operating surplus. The excess of current liabilities over current assets is the result of a prior year deficit, and that was partially eliminated by this year's surplus and is on schedule to be entirely eliminated in the coming years.

PRIOR YEAR FINDINGS:

Observation

The School had a negative change in fund balance of \$82,528 in the governmental fund financials.

The School's current liabilities of \$295,341 are substantially higher than its current assets of \$94,506. In addition, the School has unrestricted net assets of negative \$179,634.

Management Response

Prior year findings have been addressed by increasing student enrollment which in turn resulted in a positive fund balance and a decrease in current liabilities.

The opening of the Middle School in 2005-2006 lowered the fixed cost as the two schools shared the same facility. This sharing of the facility and its operating cost is forecasted to substantially improve the ratio of assets to liabilities in the school's financial position.
