INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying component unit basic financial statements of governmental activities and each major fund Charter School at Waterstone, Inc. ("School") a component unit of The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the foregoing table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the component unit financial statements are free of material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the component unit financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the component unit financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the School at June 30, 2006, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The management's discussion and analysis and the budgetary comparison information on pages 2 through 5 and 12, are not required parts of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by the accounting principles generally accepted in United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquires of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated August 23, 2006, on our consideration of School's internal control structure over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grants agreement and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal over financial reporting and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered is assessing the results of our audit.

The Charter School at Waterstone, Inc. ("School") is a public charter school operating in Miami-Dade County, FL, under the sponsorship of the School District of Miami-Dade County.

Within this section of the School's annual financial report, the School's management provides narrative discussion and analysis of the financial activities of the School for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006. The School's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosures following this section.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the School's basic financial statements. The basis financial statements include: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to the financial statements. The School also includes in this report additional information to supplement the basic financial statements.

Financial Highlights

The School's assets exceed its liabilities by \$483,637, net assets for the fiscal year reported.

Total net assets are comprised of the following:

- \$440,457 in unrestricted fund
- \$43,180 investment in capital assets, net of related debt

School started its operation in August 2005 and 1,000 students were enrolled in grades kindergarten through eighth during 2005-2006.

Financial Analysis of School

Government funds are reported in the fund financial statements and encompass essentially the same functions reported as government activities in the government wide financial statements.

Primarily, all of the School's revenues are received through the sponsor and generally was provided by the State of Florida. The revenue per student each year is determined by the State of Florida and paid to the School based upon the student counts on certain dates in October and February of the fiscal year.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The School's annual report includes two government-wide financial statements. Financial reporting at this level uses a perspective similar to that found in the private sector with its basis in full accrual accounting. This includes financial statements prepared on a full accrual accounting.

The first of these government-wide statements is the Statement of Net Assets. This is the School-wide statement of position presenting information that includes all the of the School's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator whether the financial position of the School as a whole is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of the overall health of the School would extend to other nonfinancial factors such as student education, progress and improvements.

The second government-wide statement is the *Statement of Activities*, which reports how the School's net assets changed during the current fiscal year. All current year revenues and expenses are included regardless of when cash is received or paid. An important purpose of the design of the statement of activities is to show the financial reliance of the School's distinct activities or functions on revenues provided by the school district and other private grants.

The accompanying notes to the financial statements provide information essential to a full understanding of the financial statements.

Both government-wide financial statements distinguish governmental activities of the School that are principally supported by intergovernmental revenues, and other grants.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is an accountability unit used to maintain control over resources segregated for specific activities or objectives. The School uses funds to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related laws and regulation. Within the basic financial statements, fund financial statements focus on the School's most significant funds.

Governmental Fund

Government funds are reported in the fund financial statements and encompass essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, the focus is very different with funds statements providing a distinctive view of the School's governmental funds. These are useful in evaluating annual financing requirements of governmental programs and the commitment of spendable resources for the near term.

Proprietary Funds

Proprietary funds are reported in the fund financial statements and generally report services for which the School charges a fee. For fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, the School did not have any proprietary funds.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE MAJOR FUND

GENERAL FUND

The general fund is the operating fund. It recognized \$6,538,273 in total revenues and \$411,241 in capital lease proceeds offset by \$6,508,922 expenditures. This resulted in excess of revenues over expenditures.

As of June 30, 2006, the School had \$412,055 invested in capital assets, as reflected in below.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. <u>Organization</u>

Charter School at Waterstone, Inc. ("School") was established as a non-profit organization in February 2004 under the laws of the State of Florida.

The School operates under Florida statutes 228.056(7) as a Charter School Contract with the School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida (the School District). Under the Charter the School provides education to children of kindergarten to eighth grade in Miami-Dade County.

The Charter requires the District to provide the School's primary source of funding based upon the number of full-time equivalent students registered at the School.

The School is a component unit of School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

2. Reporting Entity

The School's financial reporting entity consists of the following:

- The primary government
- Organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable
- Other organizations that, because of the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government, may not be excluded from the financial reporting entity.

There are no component units; however, the School is a component unit of School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financials statements include the statement of net assets and the statement of activities. These statements report financial information for the School as a whole.

The statement of activities report the expenses of a given function offset by program revenues directly connected with the functional program. A function is an assembly of similar activities and may include positions of a fund or summarize more than one fund to capture the expense and program revenues associated with a district functional activity. Program revenues include: (1) charges for services which report fees and other charges and (2) operating grants and contributions which finance annual operating activities including restricted investment income. These revenues are subject to externally imposed restrictions to these programs uses.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements are provided for governmental fund. Major individual governmental funds are reported in separate column.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

3. Measure Focus, basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of the School are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The reporting entity applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. The government-wide financial statements apply Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) pronouncements and Accounting Principles Board (APB) opinion issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements, in which case, GASB prevails.

The government-wide statements report using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting generally including the reclassification or elimination of internal activity (between or within funds). Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred.

Governmental fund financial statements report using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities. The School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred.

Major revenues sources susceptible to accrual include: intergovernmental revenues, and investment income.

4. Major Fund

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund. It is used to account for all current financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund of the School.

5. <u>Capital Assets, Depreciation</u>

The School's property, equipment, and infrastructure with useful lives of more than one year are stated at historical cost and comprehensively reported in the government wide financial statements.

The School generally capitalizes assets with cost of \$750 or more as outlays occur. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the asset value or materially extend useful lives are expensed. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method. When capital assets are disposed, the cost and applicable accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in operation. Estimated useful lives, in years, for depreciable assets are as follows:

6. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. The actual results could differ from those estimates.

7. Budget

Budget to actual comparison are reflected in the accompanying financial statements for general fund type which the School has adopted for its operations. The School adopts its budget on basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles. The budget control is total expenditures since there are no departments.

NOTE B - SCHOOL DISTRICT OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY

The School has an agreement with the School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida, to operate a Charter School. The School receives funding from the School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida, based on the projected number of full time equivalent (FTE) students. The term of the agreement began June 15, 2005, and will end on June 30, 2010. Thereafter, the agreement may be renewed for an additional fifteen years. The enrollment for year ended June 30, 2006 was 1,000 students.

NOTE D - RENT

The School leases school facilities from a third party. The lease began on August 1, 2005 and the lease expires on July 1, 2035. The School has the right to cancel the lease upon providing thirty (30) days written notice. The rental expense was \$1,051,549 for the year ended June 30, 2006.

NOTE E - CAPITAL LEASE

On March 10, 2006, the School entered into two capital leases for purchase of school equipment and educational supplies. The term of lease is set at thirty six month with interest rate of 10.6% and 14.5%, and monthly payment of \$7,136 and \$6,465 respectively. The minimum future payments under leases are as follows:

NOTE F - CERTIFATES OF DEPOSITS

At June 30, 2006, the School had \$200,000 in 3.9% certificates of deposit with a maturity date of July 23, 2006. It is the intent of the School to hold these certificates until maturity. If these certificates were to be liquidated prior to maturity, it would be subject to market fluctuations and possible early withdrawal penalties.

NOTE G - CONTINGENCIES

The School receives funding through the School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida, that is based in part on a computation of the number of full time equivalent ("FTE") students enrolled. The accuracy of data compiled supporting the FTE count is subject to audit, and if found to be in error, could result in refunds or in decreases of future funding allocations. It is the opinion of management that the amount of revenue which may be remitted back due to errors in the FTE count, if any, will not be material to the financial position of the School. In addition, the continued operation of the School is depended upon an agreement with School District of Miami-Dade County, Florida.

NOTE H - RISK MANAGEMENT

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to limited torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions and natural disasters for which the School carries commercial insurance.

On August 31, 2005, the School entered into a five year contract with Charter School Associates, Inc. for professional services. The Charter School Associates, Inc. agreed to plan, develop and manage the School operations. We have issued our Independent Auditors' Report on Internal Control over financial Reporting and on compliance and other matters based on the audit of the financial statements performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, dated August 23, 2006, and it should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

Additionally, our audit was conducted in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General, which govern the conduct of local governmental entity audits performed in the State of Florida and require that certain items be addressed in this letter.

There were no recommendations made in the preceding audit report.

As required by the Rules of the Auditor General (Section 10.554(1)(h)(2.), the scope of our audit included a review of the provisions of Section 218.415., Florida Statutes, regarding the investment of public funds. In connection with our audit, we determined that the District complied with Section 218.415, Florida Statutes.
